This policy decision presumed that programs such as Medicaid, TANF and General Assistance could pick up the slack produced by the change. This covers not only a geographic spread, but also the range of programs from those on the higher end of the spectrum to those at the lowest levels of support, giving the reader a feel for the range of funding levels and also the variety of different ways programs can be implemented. In short, this book is meant to be a handy little teaching and research tool that a professor can assign over

a night or two to fill a huge gap in the literature on a subject that many want to teach but lack the knowledge and resources to do.
