Dialogue Minotaur Books

Finally, the third interpretation [] Representations of dialogue [] invites us to address methodological questions related to the representation of this type of conversation. Echoing Bakhtin, contributors were invited to explore the polyphonic, heteroglot, or dialogic character of any text, discourse or interaction.
